




### <u>Forest Park Primary School 2016 – 2017</u> Pupil Premium Closing the Gap Data Report



## Year 6 - 51 pupils in cohort 6 pupils eligible 45 pupils not eligible







£7,800 Pupil Premium money has been spent on this year group.

Data shows that in reading the gap has stayed the same, with neither group making more or less progress than the other. The gap has widened in writing and mathematics, with non-pupil premium out performing pupil premium. However, progress has been made in both pupil premium and non-pupil premium children.

Progress is being made due to quality first teaching to a good standard.







# Forest Park Primary School 2016-2017 Pupil Premium Closing the Gap Data Report



## Year 5 - 59 pupils in cohort 24 pupils eligible 35 pupils not eligible







£31,200 Pupil Premium money has been spent on this year group.
Data shows that the gap between pupil premium and non-pupil premium has stayed the same in maths and writing. In reading the gap has widen slightly, with a 0.3 difference. Pupil premium have made more progress than non-pupil premium children.









Year 4 - 54 pupils in cohort

Data shows that the gap has widened in all 3 curriculum areas in the favour of non-pupil premium children as they have outperformed pupil premium with regards to progress. The largest gap in progress is in writing.

Progress is being made due to quality first teaching to a good standard.







