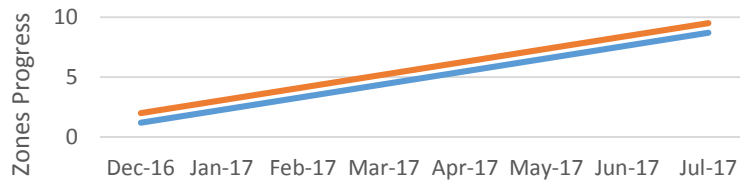

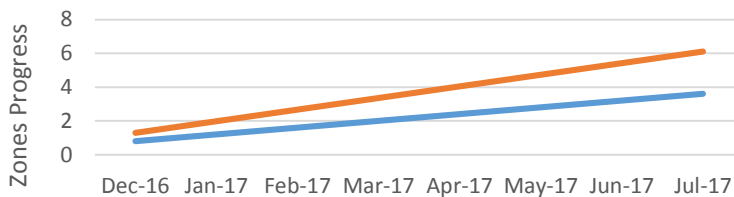
Closing the Gap Data - 2016-2017 Year 6 Reading

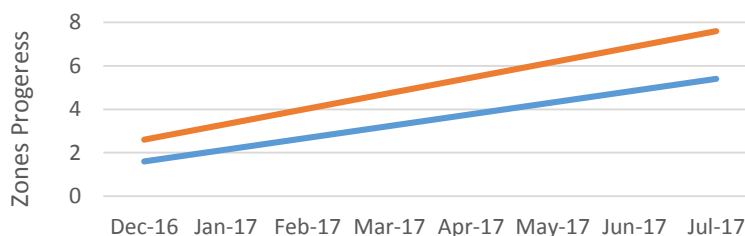

The gap has widened in writing and mathematics, with non-pupil premium out performing pupil premium. However, progress has been made in both pupil premium and non-pupil premium children.

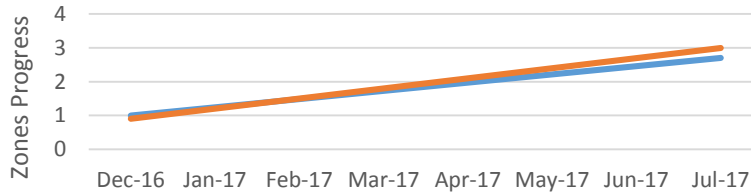

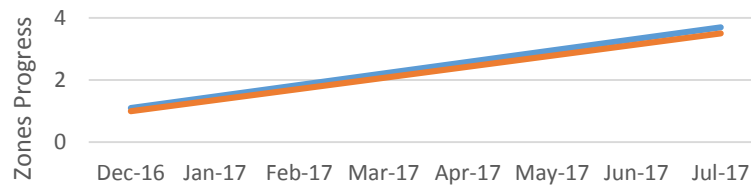
Closing the Gap Data 2016-2017 Year 5 Reading

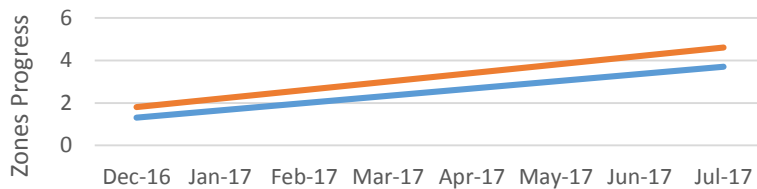
Closing the Gap Data 2016-2017 Year 5 Writing

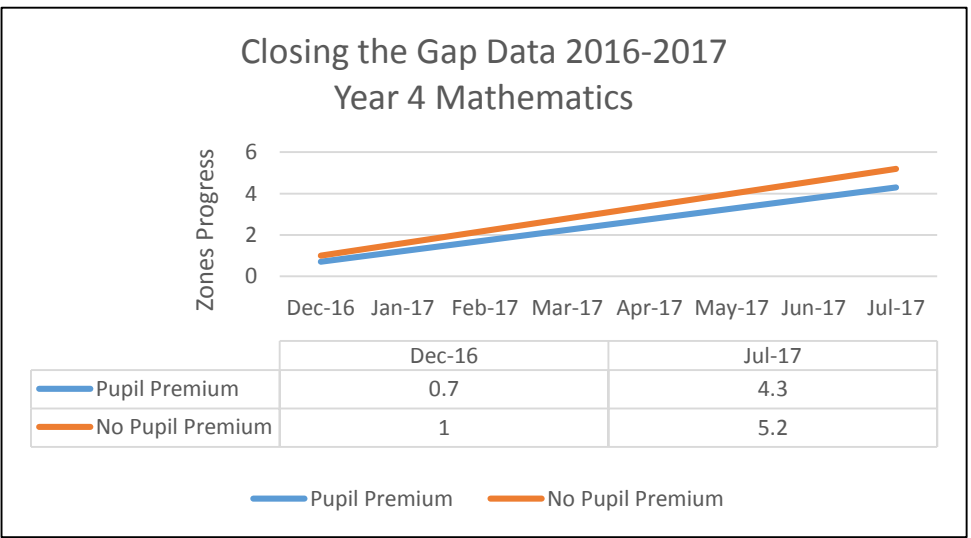
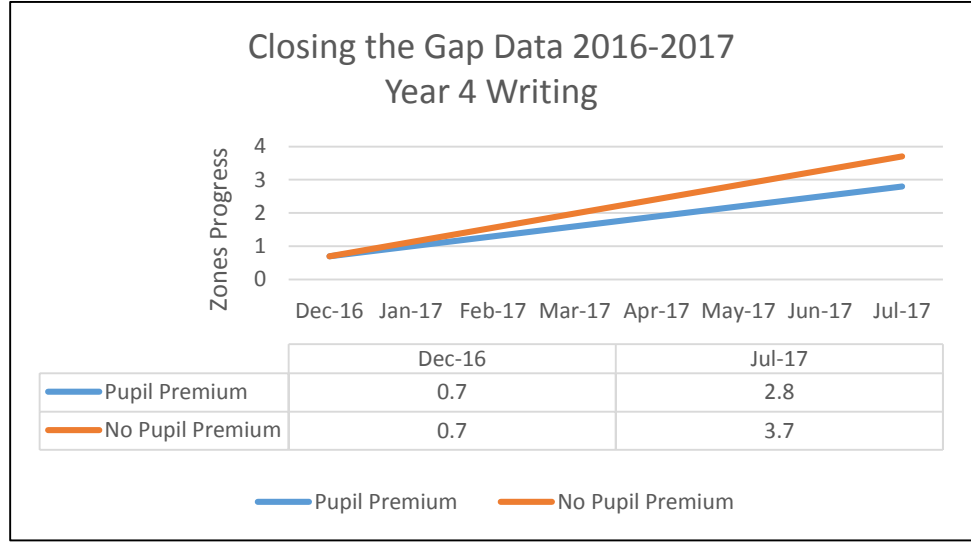
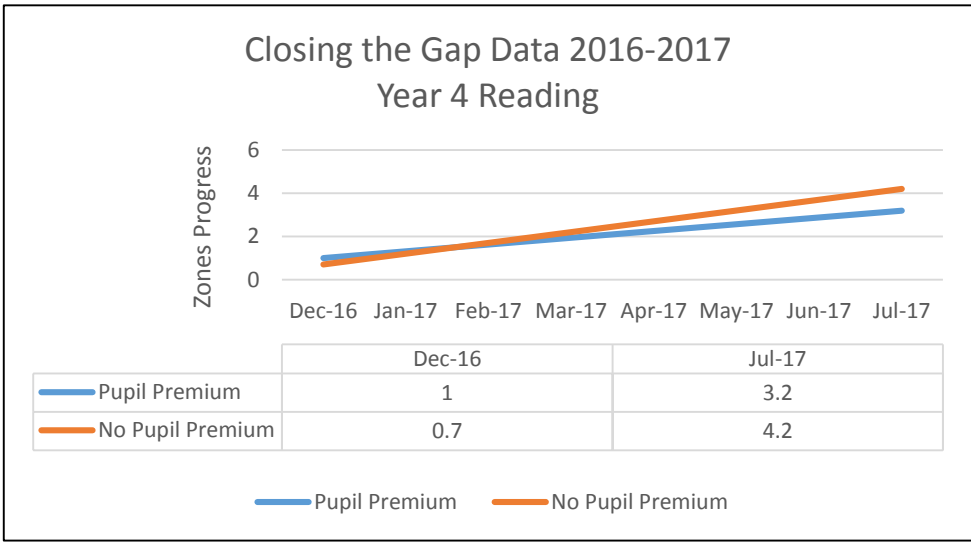
£31,200 Pupil Premium money has been spent on this year group. Data shows that the gap between pupil premium and non-pupil premium has stayed the same in maths and writing. In reading the gap has widen slightly, with a 0.3 difference. Pupil premium have made more progress than non-pupil premium children.

£42,900 Pupil Premium money has been spent on this year group. Data shows that the gap has widened in all 3 curriculum areas in the favour of non-pupil premium children as they have outperformed pupil premium with regards to progress. The largest gap in progress is in writing.

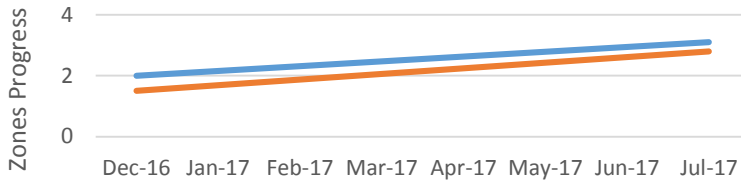

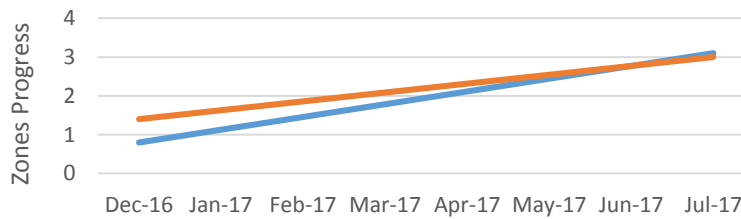

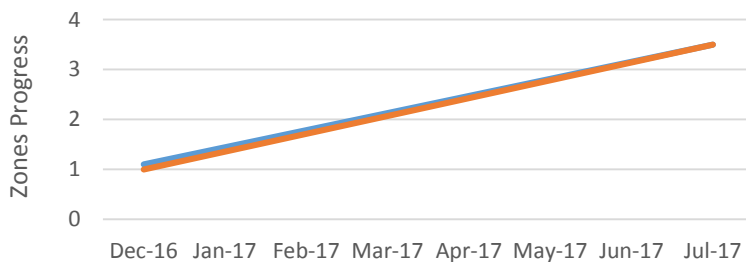
