## Topic Review

In January, we were learning about pirates in history and materials in science. Rewind your brains to answer these questions/complete the challenges:

1. Draw your own treasure map, add some obstacles and finally draw an X to mark where your treasure is hidden.
2. Play a game with someone in your house. Direct them to the treasure using the correct language - North, South, East and West. Make sure you tell them how many steps to take. Take it in turns to direct each other.
3. Using junk materials from around your house, make a pirate ship that will float in water. Think about which materials might float and be waterproof. Test your ship, did it float? What could you do differently if you were going to repeat this experiment?
4. Find a picture of a pirate in a book or online. Write descriptive sentences about their appearance. Remember a sentence needs a capital letter, punctuation at the end and a verb.
5. Now, write descriptive sentences about what your pirate might have been like. Were they kind? Or mean? Were they quiet? Or did they shout a lot?
